The *Green Rose* is a china and classified as white; however the flowers are green, often touched with bronze and are narrow leaf-like petals. The size of the bloom is 1 1/2 to 2 inches and is double. It is a recurrent bloomer and the blooms are long lasting. The plant has medium upright growth. It

January Consulting Rosarian Report By Mary Maud Sharpe

Yes, the weather outside is cold and we have had a crazy mixed up winter, so far, but with the recent cold our roses should be getting some dormancy. Rose need a rest and so do we. January is planning month, so use it to the fullest. Decide what roses you will keep and decide if any need to be replaced. If you do replace decide if you want the same varieties—just new plants or if you would like to try new varieties. If you have not done your soil test it is not too late. You may need to add lime. This will greatly help with what needs to be done to your beds. Select a dormant spray and use it very soon. Clean out winter weeds. Check our supplies and purchase wat you will need during the coming year. Be sure that your sprayer and other equipment are clean and in good working order. Check your irrigation system, if you have one, to make sure that it is in working order—better now than later. Clean and sharpen your clipper so that you are ready to start pruning mid February to early March. Remember not to start too early since new growth may be killed if pruning is done too early. If you have questions ask any of the consulting rosarians. Their names and contact information is listed on page 4.

Tetanus What You Should Know and What You Should Do (Reprinted)

All gardeners should be aware of some basic facts about tetanus and make certain that their tetanus immunizations are current. The wound need be no larger than a thorn prick to harbor bacteria to produce the toxin which is very poisonous. In recent years approximately 11% of reported tetanus cases have been fatal. The highest mortality rates are in unvaccinated persons and persons over 60 years of age. Tetanus, also called lockjaw is a medical condition characterized by a contraction of muscle fibers. The incubation period is usually about 8 days, but may be as long as several months. There is no blood test that can be used to diagnose tetanus. Diagnosis is made from symptoms. It is best to prevent tetanus by vaccination. The CDC recommends that adults receive a booster vaccine every ten years. Some doctors recommend boosters every five years. It is standard practice to have a booster if persons are uncertain of when they were vaccinated. Tetanus occurs in soils rich in organic matter. Tetanus is often associated with rust, especially rusty nails. This concept is misleading, but the rough surface of rusty metal provides a habitat for C. tetani endospore and the nail may puncture the skin and allow endospore to enter the wound. When tetanus infection does occur, it is highly lethal. If a tetanus develops in an person who has not been immunized, the fatality rate runs from 45 to 55 percent with the best hospital care. Always consult you health care provider for more information. Never neglect a wound. Keep your booster vaccinations up to date! It is easy to protect vourself.

A Year of Roses

January

- Make plans for the year
- Order Plants and supplies
- Clean up existing beds

February

- Prune
- Add organics, lime and Epsom salts
- Re-mulch

March

- Begin spraying when bushes leaf out
- Water, water, water
- Wash foliage with water if frost forms

April

- Watch for insects and disease and take action
- Enjoy your first blooms

May

- Continue to water, fertilize and spray during the bloom cycles.
- Deadhead spent blooms.

June

 Protect yourself from summer heat. Work in your garden in early morning or late evening

July

 Roses will be stressed and blooms will be small. Don't despair and continue your rose care.

August

Remove any dead wood. Cooler weather is on the way.

September

 Do a cut back pruning on Labor Day for bigger better fall blooms.

October

 Enjoy some of the best blooms of the year! Exhibit at the local show.

November

- Discontinue feeding your plants. Tender new growth can be harmed during fall and winter.
- Discontinue deadheading and allow plants to become dormant.

December

- Prepare new beds and have a soil test done.
- Reminisce on your fun year with roses.
