Glowing Amber, a miniature rose, was introduced by George Mander in 1996 and has been elected to the Miniature and Miniflora Rose Hall of Fame. The announcement was made at the **ARS National Miniature** Conference in Columbus. Ohio in June. It is a red

blend miniature with blooms scarlet red with deep yellow reverse and a vellow center. The blooms are 1 1/2 to 2 inches in diameter and are one bloom per stem. The blooms are high centered and star shaped. The foliage is dark green. It (continued on page 2)

August Consulting Rosarian Report By Hank Rosen

August is a month of high temperatures for the rose grower in the big bend area. This summer has been very hot with 90+ degree days going back a couple of months. With temperatures this high, our rose bushes (and us rosarians) needs all of the help they can get. Fortunately most of us have been getting plenty of rain this summer. If you live in an area that has not been getting the usual afternoon showers, then you need to be watering at least a couple of times a week. I recommend watering with irrigation for about 15 minutes two to three times a week. If you don't have irrigation, use a hose and water thoroughly. Two days after watering, check the soil moisture with your index finger at a depth of 2-3 inches to see if the soil is wet. If not, go ahead and water again and recheck again in a couple of days.

This month is also a good time of year to check your mulch. Mulch performs several functions in the garden, including keeping the soil moist so that it does not dry out quickly. A good 3-4" layer of mulch of pine straw or oak leaves should be adequate. If your mulch is less than this, consider adding some to it. Mulch is also critical for keeping the weeds down. If you notice weeds popping out through the mulch, hand pick them as soon as you notice them to keep them from proliferating. Being diligent with your spray program is also important. Be persistent and continue to spray every 10-14 days to keep fungal problems at bay. I recommend you use Manzate or Dithane 45 and Banner Maxx on the above schedule. As an alternative, you can use Immunox instead of the Banner Maxx. Pick off any distressed or diseased leaves from the bush as well as those that have fallen on your mulch. Spray with pesticides only when insect damage is noted. Be sure to water before you spray as well as before fertilizing.

Toward the end of the month and going into September you will want to add organics to your garden soil and water them in well.

Follow these steps and you should be growing beautiful rose bushes and roses to enjoy and show at the fall rose shows, including the Tallahassee Rose Show at the end of October.

Miniatures and Minifloras

Miniature and Miniflora blooms resemble tiny hybrid teas and can produce a big mass of little blooms similar to a small scale floribunda. Plants can be used in interesting ways in your garden. Climbing miniatures and miniature standards (or often called tree roses) also make excellent garden plants. The Miniflora classification was made when some miniature roses began to approach the size of floribundas. Some oversized miniatures were reclassified and many new minifloras are being bred and introduced. Most of these roses are sold on their own rootstock. Rosarians in our area usually prefer fortuniana grafted plants. Outdoor Miniatures and Minifloras are suited for growing in tubs and other containers (larger than the pots for supermarket plants). All miniatures are repeat bloomers and are nearly always in bloom during the summer. They do well in full morning sun and filtered afternoon shade. Many rosarians use miniature roses in their landscape as plantings along a walkway. Miniatures work well in rock gardens, decks and patios and small beds by themselves. Miniatures and Minifloras are generally easy care.

TARS Annual Rose Show

The show date will be Saturday, October 31. The location of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, 3125 has been secured. The theme of the show that has been selected is "A Rose for Every Garden". Many committees have begun work and final plans are being made. We will be inviting out of town exhibitors; however, we need as many members of TARS as possible to bring roses from their gardens to exhibit to make the show a success. The schedule will be similar to our previous schedule which includes horticulture and arrangement divisions. A photography division that was added in 2014 will be continued. Schedules will be available prior to the show. If you are interested in being a novice exhibitor, and we hope that you are, there are experienced exhibitors that will be very pleased to give you some pointers. Show awards or monies to purchase awards are being solicited. The committees will need members to help on set up and during the show. The annual rose show is our major outreach to the public. Let's make this 31st show the best ever!
