Tranquility is a shrub that has light yellow to pure white blooms. The blooms have neatly placed petals that form a perfect rosette. The light yellow of the buds quickly fades to white. The bloom size is 3 1/2 inches and the petal count is 110. They have a light apple fragrance. The

growth of the plant is vigorous, upright and bushy. It is almost thornless and very healthy. It grows four feet by three feet and could be larger in our area. The hybridizer is David Austin and it is a 2014 new rose introduction. It could be a great new plant for your garden this year!

January Consulting Rosarian Report

January is the time to relax from the routine chores of rose growing. This gives us time to search the catalogs for new varieties to replace the ones we have shovel pruned. If you have not grown any Old Garden Roses, give these a try. I like Carefree Beauty, Mutabilis, and Prosperity. These will go on sale at Goodwood on Saturday, February 8 beginning at 9:00 am. Have your soil ready for these new arrivals.

Plan to get you clippers and loppers sharpened because February is pruning time. Check your fertilizer and spray supplies and purchase what you will need.

And, as Bill Price always suggested, "Form the habit of keeping records. Record the date each time you spray and fertilize listing what you used and the amount."

Tetanus What You Should Know and What You Should Do (Reprinted)

All gardeners should be aware of some basic facts about tetanus and make certain that their tetanus immunizations are current. The wound need be no larger than a thorn prick to harbor bacteria to produce the toxin which is very poisonous. In recent years approximately 11% of reported tetanus cases have been fatal. The highest mortality rates are in unvaccinated persons and persons over 60 years of age. Tetanus, also called lockjaw is a medical condition characterized by a contraction of muscle fibers. The incubation period is usually about 8 days, but may be as long as several months. There is no blood test that can be used to diagnose tetanus. Diagnosis is made from symptoms. It is best to prevent tetanus by vaccination. The CDC recommends that adults receive a booster vaccine every ten years. Some doctors recommend boosters every five years. It is standard practice to have a booster if persons are uncertain of when they were vaccinated. Tetanus occurs in soils rich in organic matter. Tetanus is often associated with rust, especially rusty nails. This concept is misleading, but the rough surface of rusty metal provides a habitat for C. tetani endospore and the nail may puncture the skin and allow endospore to enter the wound. When tetanus infection does occur, it is highly lethal. If a tetanus develops in an person who has not been immunized, the fatality rate runs from 45 to 55 percent with the best hospital care. Always consult you health care provider for more information. Never neglect a wound. Keep your booster vaccinations up to date! It is easy to protect yourself.

2014 Resolutions

There has been a lot said for the advantages of New Year Resolutions and comments that they are too hard to keep. Many of us do not follow through as we should, but to get a chance to start anew has a certain appeal especially to rosarians since it is a new year of rose growing. So here are a few for you to consider.

- Grow better roses.
- Remember the things that worked in the past and plan to do them again.
- Learn something new!
- Find a mentor and don't be afraid to ask for help and advise.
- Keep a calendar of what you do and when you do it to use as a reference for future activities and to remind you of things you should do and when.
- Buy at least one new rose.
- Plan to rejoin TARS and attend all the society meetings if possible. Meet a member you do not know well and visit with them.
- Get one new rose book.
- Volunteer to help on a society committee.
- Visit your rose garden more frequently just to see and smell the roses.
