My Favorite Rose—Elina By Mary Maud Sharpe

For years my favorite miniature rose has been Mary Maud, the rose named and registered for me by Dianne Giles; however, as a hybrid tea my favorite is now Elina. As many of you know our roses have not had as much care as they should have, but the several Elina plants are still

growing, blooming and have not had too much blackspot this summer. We have added some bed mix (the same mixture as used in the Peace Garden). I've always like yellow roses and *Elina* is yellow. The outer petal are slightly crinkled and that is a feature I also (Continued on Page 2)

like. I holds well on the bush as a bud and as a bloom and also holds well after being cut. The blooms are generous and it repeat blooms well. The stems are strong and the foliage is a dark green. The bush has a bushy, full growth habit. It does well in hot climates although the color fades in extremely hot weather. It was introduced in 1984 and it has a rating of 8.5. It is a native of Northern Ireland and was hybridized by Dickson. It is grown all over the world and can be a top exhibition rose. The plants we have are on Fortuniana rootstock and this may be part of the reason it has done so well in our garden. You need not be an experienced rosarian to successfully grow *Elina*.

September Consulting Rosarian Report By Pat Stanford

October has been my favorite month since I was a kid. I have always loved the weather change, the holiday season that seems to begin earlier and earlier every year, and since I started growing roses, it is a special month for beautiful fall blooms. I think the bushes enjoy the cooler days a much as I do because they always reward me with a splash of color. It would be really neat to have a special arrangement on the table during the holidays to share with family and friends.

There is still work to do, but the drudgery of summer turns to fun because I don't feel like I have lead in my shoes!

When I first moved here, I used to think October was time to stop doing everything, but since then, I have learned that the main word for October is: Continue.

Continue to feed your roses, but by now, granular fertilizers should be back in your shed on the shelf. You do not want any tender new growth to emerge during winter months. Organics release nutrients more slowly. You will want to feed your roses potassium to make their roots and stems strong enough get them through winter and increase disease resistance.

Continue to spray and remember to alternate what you use so the pests don't build up a tolerance. Our cool fall nights combined with warm days produce conditions favorable for mildew, and be aware that "bugs" like spider mites and aphids are still lurking around. I actually saw some spider mites on roses at the show!

Continue to water. Just because it is cooler, doesn't mean your plants don't need a drink. Check your soil frequently to be sure that it is damp enough.

Continue to weed your garden. Pine straw is plentiful and you should mulch your beds to help conserve moisture and keep the winter weeds to a dull roar.

October is a good time to really look at your garden and decide who will still be with you next year. If you are like me, it is hard to let one go, but if you have given a bush time, love, care and fertilizer and they are still not doing well, they may need to be replaced or relocated. If you decide to relocate, do so from late December - February. Water well before you transplant and keep them well watered after. If you decide to replace, you'll have fun going through the gazillion catalogues that are coming in the mail to find your new "baby" and plan for its debut in the spring. I LOVE the catalogues!

Enjoy the weather!
