I really enjoyed last month's discussion—it was fun hearing about how each others' gardens are faring. Most of my roses are continuing to improve. My sandy loam soil dries out so quickly that watering enough has been a daily event.

A few plants were lost and they will be replaced but I have realized that 65+ rose bushes are enough for me to take care ofalthough I still have many others on my list to get. It's 7:00 a.m. and I'm on my way out to prune and water. The bushes that seem to have done the best this summer are Mrs. B. R. Cant (Tea 1901), Napoleon (China 1835), Saint David's (Found Bermuda China), Georgetown Tea (Found Tea), Princesse de Sagan (Tea 1887), Papa Hemeray (China 1912) and Vincent Godsiff (Found Bermuda China). Bob Harper's rose

(unknown) has had many beautiful pink blooms and has been one of the healthiest plants.

Right now, I like many others, are getting plants ready for the Rose Show. Today I am putting diatomaceous earth, azomite and sludge around the plants. (I got the last 3 bags of sludge from Waukeenah). I have read that the diatomaceous earth will kill the Chilli Thrip larvae; the other 2 are to fertilize. I am continuing to spray for blight, this week using Fertilome Fire Blight spray.

Remember that in October the Nominating Committee will prepare a slate of Officers and Directors for the next year. Marion Nimis, Mona Lisa Abbott and Bob Schelhorn are on the Committee. If you have any interest in volunteering for the open positions, please let one of them know. Nominees will be announced in

the November newsletter and voted on in the November meeting.

I know you haven't forgotten the Rose Show coming up October 27-28. More volunteers are needed and hopefully if you are asked to help, your answer will be "Yes!". As you know, our Society has a small number of members so it would be great if everyone would volunteer to help make this our best Show ever. Please make an effort to enter your roses in the Show. 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October Consulting Rosarian Report

You are a member of the Tallahassee Area Rose Society. You read the newsletter. You may even attend the monthly meetings and call yourself a rosarian, but do you exhibit? NO? I don't think so. How come? Your roses wouldn't win? You've never done it before? You work on Saturdays? (My personal and very contradictory excuse for the past two years — though I have had nary a rose to enter). You can't find Conner Boulevard? PUHLLEEZZZ!!!! Admit it! You're chicken!

Step up to the plate, chickens. The society needs you to exhibit. It might be fun. You could even win a ribbon. You will see some friends and make some new ones. You will walk away from the show feeling good. I guarantee it. Having participated, you will have become part of the solution rather than part of the problem.

Yes, it is a little intimidating at first. Please don't even glance at Glenn Schulman's, Ralph and Jean Stream's or Barry Smith's roses in the staging area. They are pros and their bounty will make even experienced and winning rosarians (me) feel inadequate.

Yes, you don't know what you are doing. Your best and favorite rose has thrips. You gotta get up early. Your feet hurt. You're low on gas. Your dog ate your homework. Tuff! Exhibit anyway.

Start by enlisting a consulting rosarian. We are called "consulting" rosarians for a reason. Read the rose show schedule that Mary Maud sends you. Highlight the classes that apply to you. Make a list of questions to ask the CR. It should be long. Get and prepare some entry tags beforehand. Grab a sheet of return address labels that Jerry Lewis sent you after receiving that last check. Sharpen a couple of pencils, get some rubber bands, scissors, clippers, a microfiber towel and the 2018 ARS "Handbook for Selecting Roses" (Correct spelling is crucial).

Finally, skip your morning coffee – You'll be jacked enough. Try a mimosa or bloody Mary instead to help calm your nerves.

We are pleased that many TARS members attended the recent Seminar. The program were well presented by knowledgeable rosarians and the subjects covered were photography, sprays, old garden and shrub roses, judging ethics and discussions on updates in judging. The Thomas County Library was the location of the events of the day.

Notes for the Show

- Cut your roses as near to show time as possible. Roses that are fresh have the best chance of winning.
- Place them in water as soon as cut.
- Some roses will keep for a few days. Give it a try especially if it is a very good specimen.
- Travel carefully to the show. There are many ways to transport you entries.
- Be sure to protect the blooms and the foliage. Good foliage is important.
- Remove only the foliage that will be below the top of the container.
- Damaged foliage may be trimmed with serrated scissors.
- Fill entry tags before the day of the show if possible. This will save you valuable time on show day.
- Come early. The preparation area will be open at 6:00 am and entries will be received beginning at 7:00 am. Entries close at 10:00 am.
- Entry tags, rubber bands and schedules will be available at the classification table.
- Boxes, frames, goblets, etc. are on a first come basis, but the supply is adequate.
- There will be extra wedges. Exhibitors may use wedges to position specimens.
- Help will be provided for novice exhibitors. Just ask.
- Goodies, coffee, juice and water will be available to exhibitors.
- The classification table will answer questions about entries. Other exhibitors may be too busy to help.
- When you finish your entries ask if there is any way you can help.
- The show opens to the public at 2:00 pm. Make sure to tell others.
- Invite rose lovers to exhibit and to view the show.
 Word of mouth is the best way to let others know about coming.
- Enjoy your show day. Good luck!
