Tallahassee Area Rose Society Minutes

Minutes, January 3, 2019, Meeting Jubilee Cottage, Goodwood

The meeting was called to order by Vice President Ann Stevens at 7:15 p.m.

There were no minutes for the delightful December holiday party that was held on Sunday, December 9, 2018, in the lovely home of Gerard and Marion Nimis.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Mary Maud Sharpe and was approved by those in attendance. There currently are 64 paid memberships. Members are encouraged to find a friend and to bring them to a TARS meeting. Mary Maud passed out a couple of handouts from the recent show about growing roses and about TARS that might be of interest to prospective members. Also mentioned was the District meeting that will be held in Gainesville January 18-20, 2019.

Mary Maud presented an interesting and informative talk accompanied by a PowerPoint presentation on roses that do well in the Tallahassee area. Roses growing on fortuniana rootstock are particularly well suited here. The fortuniana root stock is more resistant to nematodes, which can produce nodules on the roots and cause stress to the plant. Nematodes can be a big problem in sandy soils, but the condition can be treated. Fortuniana roses have a very unique, easily identifiable leaf appearance, and they have an attractive white flower (currently rated as an 8.0 rose). The graft of grafted plants should be maintained above ground, and one should be on the lookout for fortuniana growth stemming from the rootstock. All the grafted roses from K&M are on fortuniana rootstock. Nelson Roses in the Ocala/Orlando area and Cool Roses also sell roses grafted on fortuniana rootstock.

A few of the features roses in Mary Maud's presentation include: Elina, a yellow hybrid tea (rated 8.4); Kardinal, bright red, not a large flower, 8.4; Mr. Lincoln, rated 8.3, but that doesn't keep very well; St. Patrick, yellow, 8.3; Veteran's Honor, which is better than Mr. Lincoln and is rated at 8.4.

Grandifloras that were mentioned include Gold Medal (8.3) and Queen Elizabeth. Grandifloras generally have no more than three blooms per stem and are not as good for exhibitions.

Floribundas generally have more blooms per stem and are relatively short bushes. Sunsprite is a floribunda that does well in this area.

A couple of Old Garden Roses that do very well in this area are Belinda's Dream (8.4) and Lady Banks. Among the miniature roses, Bees Knees, an orange-yellow rated at 8.3, is good for show, as is Fairhope, rated at 8.1, that has pretty white/light yellow flowers.

One of the roses presented in her talk was a very pretty one, named Mary Maud. Mary Maud and Ann are experimenting with grafting roses in order to produce more Peace rose plants. Mary Maud gave a brief demonstration on doing grafting and noted that one needs a grafting knife for this procedure.

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The meeting was adjourned at 8:11 pm, for a splendid variety of treats offered by Mary Maud Sharpe, Martha Dooley, and Ann Stevens.

February Consulting Rosarian Report

We hope you have planned the changes you wish to make in your garden for the spring. Now is the time to put those plans into action. The local nurseries have plants and it is time to begin planting, pruning and all the other routines of watering, fertilizing, spraying and replacing mulch. There is a hint of spring in the air. Some flowering trees are blooming. Pruning is the most important task and it needs to be completed usually by the first week of March in our area. There are general rules that need to be followed, but each plant grows differently and each rosarian has their own approach and guidelines. One rule is don't worry after you have pruned because you can't put a lopped off cane back on the bush. Very rarely will a plant die from pruning. Generally it seems to give them the energy to come back and begin their new growth. There have been volumes written about pruning and it is worth while to read articles by other rosarians. However, if your way is working, stick to it. Come to our February meeting and program! Contact any of the Consulting Rosarians for help.

DSD/CR School

Mark your calendars now for the DSD/CR school to be held here in Tallahassee on Saturday, June 22 at Jubilee Cottage, Goodwood Museum and Gardens. This is your chance to become an ARS Consulting Rosarian or update if you are all ready a CR. It begins at 9:00 am and lunch will be served. The program is four hours. There is no charge unless you decide to take the test. There is a \$10.00 fee to ARS for the test. The test is open book. You may attend just for information if you like. The Pensacola and Thomasville Rose Societies will be co-host with TARS. We did this earlier in 2017 and it was quite successful. Please help us spread the word and tell others. Tips on Sharpening Your Clippers

To do a professional cleaning and sharpening all parts of the clippers should be taken apart and cleaned thoroughly. You will need a small wrench to loosen and the nut. Lay the parts out so that you will remember exactly how to put them back together. All parts should be cleaned to remove any grim and also any plant sap or tar that has collected. "Goo Gone" may be the best, but any good solvent can work.

Most clippers are bypass and only the cutting blade should be sharpened. If clippers are extremely dull, start with a small file to begin the sharpening process. Use one stroke – not a back and forth motion. For finer sharpening continue with a whetstone, very fine sandpaper or special tape with a fine abrasive.

Use white grease (buy at local hardware stores or auto supply stores) on the inside part of the blades and wipe off excess.

Reassemble the clippers and adjust the tension on the nut so that the clippers move freely, but are firmly tightened.

The test is to try to cut a piece of regular letter paper. If you have done the process properly your clippers are ready to prune your roses without damaging the plant canes. You may have to adjust the tension.

Congratulations! Your clippers are ready to use to prune your roses.
