Thought You'd Like To Know—White Success

White Success is a hybrid tea that was introduced by Robert G. Jelly in 1985. It is a white and/or white blend which is very full with 40+ petals. The blooms are large 4-5 inches and are high centered. Although it has no fragrance it reblooms well. It has showy blooms in spring, summer and

fall. It does best in full sun and is good for exhibition and as a garden cut flower. Its parentage is Bridal Pink x seedling. It has stood the test of time and is a good all round white to add to your garden. Give it a try. We think you will be pleased to have it in your garden.

May Consulting Rosarian Report

Now that the Thomasville Rose Show is history it is time to enjoy the fruits of our labor. We should be enjoying the second flush of our blooms.

Some things to-do during the month of May are to continue to deadhead to keep our bushes healthy. A menace to watch for is spider mites. They usually appear the last of April or the first of May. They appear on the underside of the leaves and will defoliate the plants if not controlled. Wash the underside of the leaves with a water wand of a strong stream of water is effective but using a chemical spray such as Avid, Floramite SC or Shuttle SC have been very effective for me. Whatever product you use, please read the direction on the label and use the recommended amounts. Take a good shower after spraying.

The rose plants need to be well watered before and after you fertilize and before you spray. When it is hot and dry I water twice a week. It is almost impossible to over water and don't be afraid to get water on the leaves—the plants love a bath. The mulch needs to be thick enough to keep the beds cool and weeds to a minimum. Keep a calendar of what you are doing in your garden—the following week we may have forgotten. Whatever your rose schedule, just be SAFE AND CONSISTENT with your program. Have a great summer.

ARS/DSD Exhibitor/Judging Schools

The society is considering co-sponsoring with the Pensacola rose society judging schools to be held either in mid-June or early fall. The event would also be for exhibitors in rose shows who exhibit in horticulture, arrangements and photography. The school would be a district event and conducted by the district chairs for horticulture, arrangements and photography. We need your feedback to know if you would be interested in attending so that plans can be made. The school would be held on a weekend and each session would be scheduled to last about four hours. Attendees who would like to become judges could take the required ARS test. Contact president Jan Godfrey or Mary Maud Sharpe. See contact information on page four. In 2017 we sponsored a CR school that was well attended.

Thomasville 97th Rose Show

The Thomasville Rose Society celebrated the 97th annual rose show. It was held in the Big Tent downtown on Friday, April 27 and Saturday, April 28. Donna Harrell, a Thomasville member won the queen, princess and a court of honor. Ralph and Jean Stream won the queen, king a princess of miniatures and of minifloras. Martha and Jim Dooley won the hybrid tea spray with Pat's Choice, the climber with Don Juan and floater with Mister Lincoln. We are so proud of the Dooley's.

Summer Care of Roses

What to do now to have beautiful bloom in the fall

Begin to shape your plants. Each time you cut roses you are pruning. During August begin to cut back longer stems. Cut out dead wood anytime and especially late summer.

At the end of August do pruning for fall. Cut back no more than one third of plant growth. Pruning should not be as severe as in the spring. Later pruning will result in tender growth going into winter. Cut back gives larger fall blooms.

Follow similar routine as in spring for fertilizing. Fertilizers containing nitrogen can be applied until early October. Plants need to be hardened off and develop dormancy before winter cold.

Continue weekly spray program. Spraying is a must as many pests may over winter.

Plan for new beds and plantings. Late summer / early fall is a good time to plan for moving plants, adding and preparing new beds. Evaluate the plants you have and select new ones if necessary.

Landscape with different types of roses. Read books and visit other gardens. You can make your garden more interesting with the many types and growth habits of roses. Mass plantings make a bold statement. Many roses especially miniatures and minifloras are good as a patio potted roses.

Yes, water, water, water. Water well if rain is not sufficient. Do not over water. Use a rain gage. Check your plants regularly by feeling the soil. Remember to water both before and after fertilizing and before spraying.

Enjoy your rose and share with others! Plan to enter the fall Society show the end of October.

Reserve the last weekend in October for the 2018 annual TARS rose show. We hope that many of our members will be exhibiting this year. Plan to attend the judging school in June to learn all the tips you can. The schedule will be similar to previous years, so study the classes and plan those you can enter.
