President's Message: Jan Godfrey

The Spring Equinox was on the 20th. The first day of spring was quite chilly. An article in the American Rose—Frost and Freeze Protection made me realize again how lucky we are not to have to take the kinds of precautions against cold as our northern friends.

Many rosarians have decided to change their roses to ones that don't require spraying, are more disease resistant and may be Earth -Kind designated. Earth-Kind is a special designation given to select rose cultivars by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the Earth-Kind landscaping program. It is based on the results of extensive research and field trials and is awarded only to those roses demonstrating superior pest tolerance, combined with outstanding landscape performance. When I checked on the list of cultivars, I was pleasantly surprised to find that several of the roses in my garden were listed.

I have heard sone rosarians say that Louis Phillippe (China 1834) and Cramoisi Supérieur (Hybrid China 1832) are difficult to tell apart. Not so for me. Cramoisi Supérieur has a darker color red and it opens flat showing its yellow stamens—Louis Phillippe does not. If one can't tell by looking, it is easy by just taking a whiff. Louis Phillippe has a wonderful fragrance while Cramoisi Supérieur has hardly any to speak of.

Our rose bushes are covered in new growth and lots of buds—more than usual. I am surprised that for the first time ever Alister Stella Gray (Noisette 1894) has more than one bud on it. It is climbing up a tree and lots of the buds are pretty high up. This is quite exciting since they have a lovely yellow color that blooms in

sprays. I have been waiting for a few years for this and I am quite convinced that the addition of alfalfa is the answer.

The program at our next Zoom Meeting is to talk about and make a list of the roses that are our particular favorites and ones that we find difficult to grow. This will give our members a wonderful resource of recommended roses for our area and ones that might be problematic.

White Lady Banks blooms in spring to early summer. Yes, there is a white one as well as the well known yellow one. It was introduced in 1807. The flower is semi double and it has a violet like fragrance. It is best grown on a pilar as it

produces long, nearly thornless canes. It is a vigorous grower. The blooms are long lasting. However, it is not a repeat bloomer. It is fairly disease resistant. The Sharpe garden plant was a gift from Malcolm Manners and grows on a post with a wagon wheel top.

Tallahassee Rose Society Minutes March 4, 2021

President Jan Godfrey called the Zoom meeting to order at 7:06 pm. There were 13 people participating in this virtual meeting.

Treasurer Mary Maud Sharpe gave the Treasurer's report. Mary Maud indicated that the Deep South District dues, in the amount of \$25, would be paid on March 5. We are up to date with the American Rose Society (ARS), and the bill for insurance will be coming soon. There may be a website charge due in approximately June.

Vice President Ann Stevens reported that a good collection of rose cuttings was obtained on March 4 from the Cancer Society garden.

The Mid Winter convention will be held virtually on Saturday, March 27, from 10 am till 2 pm. Thomasville and Tallahassee will co-host the Deep South District Mid Winter meeting in January of 2022.

President Jan Godfrey mentioned that the ARS website has a list of roses that are easy to grow in the Deep South District, but there are no old garden roses on this list. Jan suggested that we make our own list of these. We also can make lists of other kinds of roses that grow well in this area.

Martha Dooley noted that small sticks could be seen in the Peace Rose Garden located in the Chain of Parks. Mary Maud stated that the City of Tallahassee has dug up the old bushes and will re-plant the garden.

The 100th Thomasville Rose Show will be held on April 23-24, which is a Friday and a Saturday. This show predates involvement with ARS; it originally was just a city show. This year, there will be no parade, just parked floats because of the continuing pandemic. Attendees and participants should wear masks. The organizers of the show are still looking for clerks. Available people for these jobs should contact Montine Herring or Bob Maxwell. K&M roses will be there. They can be contacted for special orders, or people can take a chance on what will be available.

Amy Beaven inquired about how to photograph roses effectively. Inspiration on this is needed, and requested! Favorite rose pictures should be posted on Facebook!

It would be nice to be able to visit individual rose gardens. It was noted that the City of Tallahassee has some nice rose gardens, including one near Lake Ella. The best one is on Betton and Thomasville Road. In addition, there are nice rose gardens in Thomasville. Thomasville people helped TARS to get started.

For the meeting program, Mary Maud presented a detailed history of TARS, which started in 1983. Hank Rosen was instrumental in developing excellent bylaws that have stood the test of time very well.

The first rose show was presented in 1985 in conjunction with the Garden Club. For a while, the show was held in the mall. Bill Sharpe requested use of the Conner Building; approval was granted, and most of the shows have been held there since that time. A florist helped TARS to obtain vases for the shows.

The annual rose sale at Goodwood was started in the early 1990s.

In terms of outreach, Pam Anderson designed the logo for TARS, and Marion Nimis and Jan Godfrey have worked hard on setting up a new, very nice website. Members are encouraged to look at the website and to make suggestions on how it might be updated. TARS also has a Facebook page, and Ginger, who managed this page, would appreciate help in this regard.

At 8:20 pm, Hank Rosen moved adjournment of the virtual meeting, which was seconded and carried.

Consulting Rosarian Report—March By Mary Maud Sharpe

Our winter has been a rather unusual one and we hope that with the recent weather that winter is over. There are signs of spring with many of the flowering trees blooming. However, there is no assurance that old man winter is gone. A heavy frost may do damage to tender growth. One of the best ways to avoid damage to tender growth is to sprinkle with water very early and wash away any frost. Generally the recent rainfall has provided sufficient water for gardens. As soon as plants leaf out be ready to begin your regular routine spray program. Trying to correct a problem after it occurs can be disastrous. There are many products on the market that can be used. Read the labels carefully and use only those products that you need and in the correct amounts. More than recommended is not a good idea. Abide by the safe handling rules and be sure that handling of insecticides and pesticides is correct. Remember to take care of yourself as you take care of your roses. Visit your garden often to check for insects or diseases that can be devastating if not corrected.
