Hello everyone. I hope you are all enjoying your summer—working in your garden. We've had several weeks of daily rain and although the land needed it, it's also perfect for blackspot. So now between the blackspot and the myriad of weeds, I am definitely busy. The wet weather has definitely interfered with my schedule.

I have been working on the bushes and have had a few flowers. However, my Papa Hemeray (China 1912) has never stopped. It grows in sprays of vermillion blooms with white centers. It grows very vigorously but looks quite delicate. It is growing in a large pot, 15 gallons or so, and is about 4.5 feet tall and as wide-larger than I had anticipated. Because of its unusual blossom and growth habit, and the fact that it blooms almost all year, it would be a good one to add to your list.

I am looking forward to doing the program at the August 5th meeting via Zoom. I will be sharing a more natural way of growing roses. I have been working on different combinations of natural products and have found several that the roses seem to respond to best. Each week I fertilize and spray the plants with an alternating schedule. I will explain each of the main products, how it fits into the schedule and what it does.

It's time to be thinking about the Rose Show. Both the preparations for the roses that you might want to show and the arrangements that are needed to make for another successful event. Volunteers are always welcome.

High & Magic is a beautiful hybrid tea yellow blend rose. It is a popular florist cut rose and is listed in ARS Modern Roses. The bloom is long lasting. Glenn Schulman from Pensacola is growing it and you can expect to see it on rose show tables soon. It is a rose that you may want to

consider adding to your garden. The color is unusual and eye catching. It was bred by the Dutch breeder Pressman B. V. The bloom size is medium—large and the petal count is medium—high. The stems are long and the vase life is 8 to 10 days. Enjoy it as a garden rose and to exhibit.

Tallahassee Rose Society Minutes

May 6, 2021

President Jan Godfrey called the Zoom meeting to order at 7:02 pm. Nine people participated in this virtual meeting.

Announcements: Mary Maud Sharpe announced that there would be an Exhibitor School on Saturday, June 19, from 9:00 am until 3:00 pm in the Jubilee Cottage at Goodwood. Thirty people can be accommodated there at this time, so the first 30 people who sign up will be able to come. The morning sessions will address horticulture and exhibiting, and afternoon sessions will discuss arrangements and photography. Glenn Schulman of Pensacola will be in charge, and Ralph Stream will focus on the fine points of exhibiting. The registration form is being mailed to the people on the mailing list, is on the website, and in the Deep South bulletin.

Mary Maud gave the Treasurer's report. She said that TARS now has 27 paid members, with one member renewing this month and one new member signing on. The American Rose Society membership dues were \$70 for the year, and this has been paid. The only currently outstanding payment is for the website; this was \$140.05 last year. May Maud expressed hope that TARS would be able to hold a rose show the last Saturday in October. She also said that the Deep South District meeting would be in mid October, although attendance may be limited.

The meeting program consisted of two screen-shared U -Tube presentations coordinated by Tim Holmes. One of the presentations was on Modern Rose Breeding (The Quest for Roses, by Roger Phillips), and the other was on Garden Roses, particularly Cordes roses.

The presentations included discussions of thornless roses, and these were started in 1961. Smooth Sailing is the background parent of a smooth line. Pink Favorite x Simon Bolivar was the start of another new line that had extremely glossy foliage. Blue as a color is not included in the genetic structure of roses, but breeders in the Bay Area are trying to transfer genes for the color blue from petunias.

Among cut roses, red is the favorite color in the USA. Europeans stress pink and yellow colors. The market for cut roses is much larger than that for garden roses. A couple of rose varieties used for cut roses are Santa Fe and Magnum.

There currently is considerable emphasis on breeding programs to bring back fragrance. One such fragrant variety is Magic Medellin. David Austin roses have multiple benefits, including fragrance, disease resistance, and repeat flowering.

After the U-Tube presentation, there was considerable discussion about roses that are available in this area and that do well here. Jackson & Perkins is shipping roses from Tyler, Texas. Texas A&M has Ralph Moore's miniature collection. David Austin roses have an old look but a new form and are very easy to grow. Seymour Rosen reported that Belinda's Dream, a medium pink, very double shrub rose, seems to be disease resistant and does well for him. Another nice shrub rose is Carefree Beauty,

and this rose may have been used in the development of knockout roses.

The Rose Hybridizers Association has at least two manuals, one basic (Rose Hybridizing for Beginners), and one very advanced (The Next Step). For more information, go to https: www.rosebreeders.org and then to "Help me find" to get background information of some of one's favorite roses.

The entire genome of the rose has been sequenced. Texas A&M is working on a rose database.

At 8:21 pm, Hank Rosen moved adjournment of the virtual meeting, this was seconded and carried.
