TIME TO START EARLY PREPARATIONS FOR ROSE SHOWTIME!

The Tallahassee Area Rose Society (TARS) annual rose show is still several weeks away, but it's certainly not too early to begin preparing for it. Show dates are: Friday, October 27, setup starting at 9:00 am, and then the actual show on Saturday and Sunday, October 28 and 29, 2023. The show schedule will invite horticultural entries (actual, live roses of a wide range of categories), as well as rose arrangements of various styles, and rose photography. Now is the time to lay the groundwork for the show, to strengthen your skills and knowledge, to work to grow your most beautiful roses, and to think about what categories and classes you might enter. Preparations for the show organization are moving along well. Show chairs Jan Godfrey and Amy Beaven are working hard to get volunteers, judges, materials, awards, publicity, and dealing with all the millions of details that are required for a successful rose show. I hope that you'll help them in some way—let them know how you can help. Last year, Jan, Amy, and Marion Nimis had their first experience organizing a rose show; this came after two years of no rose show at all due to the COVID epidemic, and after previous years of shows chaired by the late Mary Maud Sharpe and Ann Stevens. Last year's rose show was a wonderful success that left us all invigorated. This year, the hope is to build on last year's experience, with an even bigger and better show, with more entries from both local exhibitors and others in the area. The aim is for the show to be a really nice community event that is enjoyed by many exhibitors and show visitors.

In addition to the show preparations, what should potential exhibitors be doing right now? For one, this is the time to be grooming your roses: pruning them as appropriate, feeding them, treating for diseases or pests, aiming to get them in top shape by the end of October when the weather is cooler and more rose-friendly than it is now. This is also a great time to familiarize yourself with rose show classes that you might want to try, as well as show rules. Be sure to watch for the show schedule that outlines those rules, and to learn what you can about growing nice roses. You'll want to be very sure that your planned entries fit well with whatever classes you choose to enter, based on the rules in the show schedule. The show schedule should be out very soon, if it isn't available yet at the time when you read this.

In addition to horticultural entries of actual, live roses, I hope that you'll also consider making entries in the arrangements and photography classes.

The August TARS meeting included a hands-on arrangement workshop lead by Sandy Dixon, with the aim of giving you the tools that you need to enter arrangements in the show. Sandy is very creative and knowledgeable about various arrangement styles. She provided many interesting ideas and recommended that newbies start with simplicity in their arrangements. Now is the time to practice your skills, using any roses, or even other flowers available to you. All roses actually entered in the show will need to be outdoor grown, either from your own garden or from the gardens of friends, but you certainly can practice at home with roses from anywhere, including commercially available blossoms. If you grow your own roses for your show arrangement, be sure to mark your show entry tag with "AG", signifying Arranger Grown. This makes you eligible for some special awards.

Elsewhere in this newsletter is a summary of various categories of arrangements for you to think about, including

Traditional, Modern Abstract, and East Asian. You can enter only one arrangement in a given class, but you can enter as many classes as you wish. Rose arrangements will be judged on many criteria. The quality of the roses is a main criterion, as well as the creativity of the arrangement and how well it fits the class in which it is entered. It is recommended that you look around for creative opportunities to help you in your design, such as unique containers, findings at craft fairs or shops, and even items that you might find at a hardware store!

And still another show category for you to consider is photography. Local artist and TARS Vice President Cheryl Gifford will make a presentation at the October meeting on rose photography; you won't want to miss this! Many of today's smart phones can produce some excellent photos, so you don't need expensive equipment. Do get out there with your phone or camera, look at your roses critically, and take plenty of practice shots. Print the best of your photos, again looking critically at the results, and then look at the show schedule to decide what classes you plan to enter.

September Consulting Rosarian Report The Oldest Rose

As a kid in Vicksburg, Mississippi, I was fascinated by an antebellum rose behind my aunt's house. It was a single red rose and I never knew the name. So, I thought I'd look for a story on the oldest known rose. I found the "Rose of Hildesheim". It grows on a wall of the Hildesheim Cathedral, a Catholic cathedral in Hildesheim, Germany, that is dedicated to the Assumption of Mary. The cathedral and the adjacent St. Michael's Church have been on the UNESCO list of World Heritage Sites since 1985.

The rose that climbs on the wall of the cathedral's apse is believed to be the oldest living rose in the world. A *Rosa canina*, commonly known as a wild dog rose, it grows against the eastern apse of the cathedral, which is around 21 meters (69 ft) high and 9 meters (30 ft) wide. The rose bush reaches a height of around 10 meters (33 ft) and documentation verifies its age at approximately 700 years. The Cathedral was destroyed by Allied bombers in 1945 during the Second World War, but the roots of the rose bush survived and it blossomed again among the ruins. According to legend, while the rose bush flourishes, Hildesheim will prosper.

In the United States one of the oldest and certainly the largest is Lady Banksia in Tombstone, Arizona. It was shipped from Scotland and planted in 1885, back when **Tombstone** was a boomtown for silver mining. The tree officially covers 9,000 square feet, and its gnarled trunk is about 12 feet around. If you ever visit, make it in spring since the bush blooms only once a year.

One of the oldest still existing public rose gardens is Jules Gravereaux's Roseraie de L'Hay south of Paris in L'Hay-les-Roses, which was laid out in 1899 and remains the biggest rose garden in France.

Tonight's Meeting:

Sandy Dixon, current chair of Deep South District Arrangement Judges, led a hands-on arrangement workshop. Sandy explained the basic principles and approach for preparing a simple Traditional line arrangement and also a Modern arrangement. She then distributed the materials for each workshop participant to make their own arrangements. This included containers, Oasis foam for holding the materials, roses, and plant filler materials to give each arrangement a finished look. All the arrangements prepared by the participants were beautiful! Each person was able to take home two arrangements, one Traditional and one Modern.

Hope was expressed that many people will try their hands at entering arrangements in the Tallahassee rose show on October 28, and perhaps even at the Deep South District Fall Convention and Rose Show on October 14 in Gainesville.

The meeting was adjourned at approximately 7:45 pm.

ROSE ARRANGEMENTS Characteristics of Designs

Based on Information

Prepared for the Deep South District Fall Rose Show - October 14, 2023

Traditional Designs: Traditional Line Designs have height and some width, but very little depth except in the focal areas. They are open silhouettes in space and have length, strength and beauty. They show movement in one direction. The line may be vertical, horizontal, crescent, Hogarth (S) curve, zigzag, oblique or triangular with right-handed or left-handed variants.

Traditional Line Mass Designs have a dominant line with more plant material than a Line design. They may show gradual progression of bloom development. They have length, width and depth and show gradation of size or shape. They may show gradation of color, tint or shade. Traditional Mass Designs are characterized by large quantities of plant material in a full, but not crowded, design. The strongest line, top, and auxiliary lines serve to lead the eye to the focal area near the rim of the container. They are usually either a symmetrical or asymmetrical triangle or oval in form.

Modern Abstract Designs: Modern Abstract Designs are compositions of space, texture, color and form and are not constructed around a central focal area, but have several emergence points. Plant materials can be altered, manipulated and/or distorted and placed in a non-conventional manner. Abstraction is dominant and the design must have **two or more abstract qualities**. The rose bloom(s) should never be abstracted.

Modern Free Form Designs Modern Free Form Designs are irregular designs with a curving outline. They are inspired by nature and are nongeometric. Plant materials are used in a naturalistic way. These natural forms determine the pattern of the design. They may have more than one center of interest and more than one point of emergence.

East Asian Designs: East Asian Designs in a Low Container or Compote e.g., Shoka Shofutai, Shoka Shimputai & Moribana. The Moribana is naturalistic and has three main lines. The longest line has generous length. The second line is two-thirds the main line. The third line is one third the length of the main line. These designs are vertical, slanting or cascading. There should be depth and one-half to two-thirds of the container should show water. Foliage should not hang or droop into the water or rest on the lip of the container. The needlepoint is totally submerged in water and is placed off center and does not need to be covered completely with plant material. The Shoka Shofutai (Classical) and Shoka Shimputai (Contemporary) styles express the feelings of life, growing energy and the natural beauty of materials used.

East Asian Style Free Style Designs are placed in modern oriental style containers. The asymmetrical triangle is not required, but simplicity in construction is important. Roses are considered a mass of color. A leaf is a surface and may be smooth, rough, shiny, dull, clear or complex. Directions may be vertical, leaning, cascading, horizontal or a combination of any of these directions. Shapes and colors are very important in Oriental Free Style designs.
